Museum Etiquette:

1. Never touch anything! The oils in your fingers can easily destroy a painting and it is the fastest way to get thrown out of a museum.

2. Don't breathe on the paintings – carbon dioxide also destroys paintings

3. Whisper. There are usually students studying the paintings, sketching or taking notes, or groups trying to listen to guides.

4. Ask guards for information. They are sometimes very knowledgeable about their areas.

5. No pens allowed! Permanent ink stains permanently. Pencils are allowed.

6 No flash photography. Intense light from a flash can destroy paintings.
